CLERK: I have several amendments pending, the first by Senator Chambers. Senator, FA30, page 4, lines 3 and 4, reinstate stricken matter. (FA30, Legislative Journal page 672.)

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mister...

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Chambers, to open on your amendment.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: Yes, sir.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Let me get with you again. I was looking in one of the statutes.

CLERK: It's...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Oh, this is page 4...

CLERK: Right, lines 3 and 4.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...lines 3 and 4.

CLERK: Yes, sir.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you. Members of the Legislature, we're dealing with the green copy of the bill and in lines 3 and 4 there is language stricken. I want to put that language back into the bill. Senator Byars is trying to increase penalties here and this language that is in the bill to be stricken is designed to say that there would be no points taken from a person in this situation. Senator Byars wants to take points. But let me ask him a question so that we are clear on what it is that's being done.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Byars, would you yield to a question?

SENATOR BYARS: Yes, I will, Senator.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Byars, to refresh all of us on where we are who might be interested, would you turn to page 4 of your green copy. While he's doing that, let me touch on something
