CLERK: 14 ayes, 0 nays to place the house under call.

SENATOR CROSBY: The house is under call. Would all senators please record your presence. Would those senators not in the Chamber please return and record your presence. Would all unauthorized personnel please leave the floor. Senator Preister, Senator Bromm, Senator Bruning, the house is under call. Senator Thompson, the house is under call. All present and accounted for, we are voting on the Chambers amendment to LB 356. Senator Chambers has asked for a machine vote. All in favor vote aye, opposed no. We're voting on the Chambers amendment. Have you all voted? Senator Chambers?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: (Microphone malfunction.) ...vote.

SENATOR CROSBY: A roll call vote has been requested. We're still voting on the Chambers amendment. Mr. Clerk, please call the roll.

CLERK: (Roll call vote taken, Legislative Journal page 1400.)  
27 ayes, 13 nays on the amendment.

SENATOR CROSBY: The amendment is adopted. I'll raise the call.  
Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: Madam President, I have a priority motion. Senator Kristensen would move to bracket LB 356 until January 5 of 2000.

SENATOR CROSBY: Thank you, Mr. Clerk. Senator Kristensen, to open on your bracket motion.

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: Thank you, Madam President, members of the Legislature. It is apparent to me that at this point in time if there are 27 people here who are willing to begin to strike stricken matter, this bill's had a tremendous amount of debate on it, it's been bracketed once, if there are 27 people who are willing to make those changes this bill will probably, in an orderly fashion, begin to dismantle other parts of the bill, destroying its integrity. Now, it's not a matter of bracketing
