The bottom line is, what does this Legislature want to do with this bill today with one-third of the Legislature left? I would suggest that we bracket it, look for other ways to increase education. Certainly this body has been, and has in the past and I'm sure will in the future again, find ways to reinforce that message that if you don't wear seat belts you're a darn fool, because it can save your life. I'm going to leave the bracket motion. I fully intend to take a vote. If there were 27 of you who were willing to make that change, then I think there ought to be enough people to bracket the bill. Thank you, Madam President.

SENATOR CROSBY: Thank you, Senator Christian, discuss...Kristensen. Discussion on the bracket motion, Senator Byars.

SENATOR BYARS: Thank you, Madam Speaker. Thank you, Speaker Kristensen. Many times we come to this juncture when we have meaningful legislation in front of this body and obviously meaningful legislation to those of us as individuals, and we try always to make a decision that is thought through and that will hopefully, as time wears on, be one that is the correct one. It is...it's quite apparent to me that...and I...I want to thank Senator Chambers for the well-thought dialogue. I am going to agree to the bracket motion, but, Senator Chambers, I do want you to know very clearly it's not because you have threatened to stop the session and it's not because of your opposition solely to this bill, but it's because there is a sense in this body on the part of many others that they're not comfortable with the bill, with the legislation at this point in time. So I think it's imperative to me to continue to attempt not only to educate the public relative to the value of buckling up, but it's imperative to me to continue to educate you as my colleagues on why this legislation is worthwhile. So I won't go away, maybe for a little while, but I'll come back and I'll continue to try to educate you. At this point, I will agree to the bracket motion.
