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rural versus urban kind of discussion. And I'm willing to use the words and get at it and have a meaningful debate. I was disappointed because I think the objectives of Senator Wehrbein's bill are very legitimate. I was disappointed. I told him, off the floor earlier, that if the Chairman of the mighty Appropriations Committee can't show me a way to find the funding for the \$1.6 million that he was originally seeking, then certainly I will be lost in the wilderness. But I don't think we have to fund it from LB 775. I was surprised to read the Revenue Committee amendments and to see that we'd jumped the funding from \$1.6 million to \$30 million. And then, of course, we were dealing with real adult money, and I became even more focused. And I decided that maybe the tone for this discussion ought to be what we can all do together about our aging agricultural farm-based population, and how we can encourage young people...

SENATOR CROSBY: One minute.

SENATOR BRASHEAR: ...to remain in agriculture and on the farm. And so I wanted to look and see how agriculture does in relationship to what are perceived as the business community credits of LB 775. And I will distribute an exhibit shortly that will demonstrate, now there's a little disagreement on numbers, but for the sake of this debate I'm going to accept Senator Wehrbein's numbers. I also defer to Senator Wehrbein's numbers. But Senator Wehrbein has said that LB 775 is costing us \$150,000. Well, I'll give you an itemized specification that will show you that the benefits that we give to agriculture total \$377 million. And that's more than twice as much. And so some of the amendments that I'm going to offer are going to be to see if we can't, number one, come to a different number than \$30 million for the Beginning Farmer Act Fund, and secondly, if we can't...

SENATOR CROSBY: Time.

SENATOR BRASHEAR: ...approach this together.

SENATOR CROSBY: Thank you, Senator Brashear. Senator Dwite Pedersen, on the committee amendment.
