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quarter. About 100 years ago there was the Kinkaid Act, and that got you a half a section. There are very, very few farmers in Nebraska that are making a livelihood on less than a section. They talk about the family farms, but a family farm today can be several sections, and that runs out to eight quarters. Now, 75 years ago each one of those quarters may have had a substantial family on it. They are gone, and they will never come back. The economies of scale rule in most applications of agriculture today. And I don't think that the clock can be or should be turned back on that. I don't know how this bill will react...will regard the economic viability of a new farmer who is faced with that type of economic demand, that size of investment necessary for him to have a viable operation. While we are talking about these numbers, we're not talking about the inheritance taxes that take people off the farm. We are not talking about the increase in valuation of land that is caused, not by an increase in productivity, but by an increase in the price of land. Very, very few farmers can come on now and start writing a check. I think you have to be Ted Turner to do it. And I don't know how this piece of legislation is going to change that greatly. Farms are also a source of urban population, as people come off of them and go into the cities and furnish the well-motivated, well-trained, hard-working individuals that Nebraska farms have produced for 150 years. A farm is a business enterprise, it's a kind of an industrial chemical plant that takes various inputs and turns them into food. To take from...

SENATOR CROSBY: One minute.

SENATOR TYSON: ...other enterprises, under LB 775, to fund something like LB 630, appears to me to be counterproductive. While I would like to vote for LB 630, and like I say, I have kind of a visceral desire to beyond the numbers, I feel that we cannot rob from Peter, LB 775, to pay Paul, LB 630. Thank you, Madam.

SENATOR CROSBY: Thank you, Senator Tyson. Continuing on the committee amendment, Senator Beutler.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Senator Crosby, members of the Legislature, I'd like to get motivation straight on this bill, because I'm
