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SENATOR HARTNETT: Mr. Speaker, members of the body, Senator Wehrbein, maybe I'll ask you some questions, I think.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Yes.

SENATOR HARTNETT: I...I'm looking at Section 10, that's when you establish this board...

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Yes.

SENATOR HARTNETT: ...that identifies this beginning farmer. How do you envision this? Because to me, as I read this, and I just kind of...looks kind of vague, I guess, maybe follow up what Senator Beutler was asking you as...related to that. How do you see the person, this beginning farmer, the person that would qualify for that? And is a three-year lease...what if I start in this program, I'm the beginning farmer, start in this program and can I get out of the lease, or am I...is...are leases on the farm, the ones that I have some interest in farming, we do it, you know, one year at a time. Is a three-year lease kind of a normal thing, would be something as far as a concern? So what do you see as this beginning farmer...

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: That...well...

SENATOR HARTNETT: ...and then answer about the...about the lease, Senator Wehrbein, if you would.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Well, first of all, I guess there are provisions in it that it can be discontinued, if the parties agree. But by and large, a three-year lease is a...signifies a commitment on both parties to make something work. As you well know, if you started out with a terrifically bad year in the first year, maybe the bodies...both parties would want to terminate. On the other hand, it shouldn't be the end of the world, and perhaps somebody with hope springing eternal that they would try to come back and have the typical farmer's creed, next year will be better.

SENATOR HARTNETT: How do you see this person, how do you
