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that, thank you very much, Madam President and members.

SENATOR CROSBY: Thank you, Senator Janssen. Senator Bromm.

SENATOR BROMM: Thank you, Madam President. I would ask Senator Landis if he would yield to a couple of questions.

SENATOR CROSBY: Senator Landis, will you yield?

SENATOR LANDIS: I'll do my best.

SENATOR BROMM: Senator Landis, in explaining your amendment, if I...if I've understood it correctly, of the 30-cent increase, 24 cents was going to go to prevention, 4 cents to new cancer research, and 2 cents to hold harmless existing projects that might be affected by reduced consumption. Is that accurate?

SENATOR LANDIS: Right.

SENATOR BROMM: Okay, the 24 cents for prevention, could you tell me where or how or who's going to decide how that's going to be used or spent. What's the...what is the apparatus for the 24 cents?

SENATOR LANDIS: Two cents of that goes to the Highway Patrol for enforcement, and others amount...other amounts of it go to the Tobacco Prevention Control and Enforcement Fund, and that fund is outlined in the measure. So if you're asking me where the prevention goes, it goes to the Nebraska Prevention Control and Enforcement Fund.

SENATOR BROMM: Okay. And then who decides how that fund's going to be used? Is that outlined in the...I might have missed that, but that Tobacco Prevention Control and Enforcement Fund money, outside of the 2 cents that goes to the Highway Patrol for enforcement, the 22 cents, who's in charge of deciding how to use that money?

SENATOR LANDIS: Let me tell you, if you'll take a look on page 6, it says the State Patrol Tobacco Enforcement Fund is created. The fund shall be administered by the Nebraska State Patrol, used for enforcement of federal and state laws relating
