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about that a little bit. I think it would be helpful to have some oversight. And, as far as I know, there's no provision for any kind of reporting back to the Legislature. Is that true? That's not true. Okay, I'll just let you answer on your own time, because I bet mine's just about out, Senator Landis. Thank you.

SENATOR CROSBY: Thank you, Senator Schimek. Senator Wickersham.

SENATOR WICKERSHAM: Thank you, Madam President. I'm almost sorry that I brought up the issue of border bleeding because it is subjected to all kinds of data and suggestions that facts are facts and that either the facts support one position or support the other position. I think that, aside from all of that bantering about of data and statistics, you need to just think about human beings and how they behave and what will they do to save money, and particularly what will they do to save money for something that they want, that's all, and then try to figure it out. And whether it's \$1 million or \$2 million or \$3 million or \$10 million or X number of packs of cigarettes, well, you can kind of start figuring that out as well. But just think about human beings and how human beings behave, in fact, how they're told to behave. They're constantly encouraged to be able to purchase at the lowest cost, to save money, to do what is in their best interest. That's the way things work. What will they do if we increase taxes to the extent that Senator Landis is proposing either in the bill in its main, or now in his amendment? Will they attempt to save money? Will they do what they've been trained to do? Now, the other issue is what does Senator Landis want to do with the money? And one of the things that I think, if...and we didn't pay a great deal of attention to this in the Revenue Committee but I think it's more...it's, in a way, a kind of an appropriations issue and an issue of oversight for this Legislature, and maybe that's something that we would develop subsequently. I think I could anticipate that response from Senator Landis. But we're going to devote 24 cents of tax to a particular fund called the Tobacco Prevention Control and Enforcement Fund. That's going to be at least \$24 million, maybe more. What are we going to do? What activities are going to be carried out in the Tobacco Prevention Control and Enforcement Fund. Well, I think, Senator Landis, if
