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90-day session, Legislature raises taxes. We even have a surplus. I asked Senator Raikes about that earlier just to make sure. So, you know, we have a surplus. What do we do? We raise taxes. I see this as a tax bill. I am sympathetic to what people are saying about the kids but, frankly, you know, Senator Matzke, all due respect, it's not illegal to buy cigarettes if you're a juvenile in Nebraska. It's illegal to sell them. Everything's on the retailer. It's not illegal to possess them. If you wanted to do things about juvenile smoking, then just do them. Say we're going to have a criminal or a civil penalty because we don't want anyone to not be able to go join the bar or anything like that or not join the service or whatever. Let's just have a civil penalty, 25 bucks or whatever. If it's as bad as alcohol, you know, treat it like it, you know. When do you have minor MIPs for cigarettes? You don't. It's a legitimate way to curb juvenile smoking to raise the taxes on cigarettes. I think that's something that, obviously, some people believe in. I choose not to subscribe to that route. I would rather directly address the question at hand and let's deal with juvenile smoking. So I'm not going to support this tax increase. Of all...when I ran for office, all the people, you know, one thing I did not hear is that, John, when...if you get to Lincoln, please raise taxes because they're just not high enough. Our cigarette taxes are already the highest in any bordering state. I'm just not going to support it. I'm sympathetic to the cause that's being illustrated here. And I will say this. I don't mean to be flippant, but it's interesting that there is a direct correlation between the price of cigarettes and the amount of juvenile smoking. That would infer that this is an economically sensitive conduct. It almost would say that it's not addictive. It's almost as if it's agreeing with, what was it, Bob Dole, who didn't know whether tobacco was addic...I believe it is addictive. But it is interesting that I guess it's not addictive enough that if you raise the price smoking will go down. And I know that there's studies exist and so forth, but I just kind of found that that was kind of interesting. But, again, I'm...congratulate, you know, the concern of my colleagues who want to do something about juvenile smoking but, you know, in this session to say, well, jeez, what we're going to do today is we're going to raise taxes, I'm not going to support that.
