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think that border bleeding is a valid argument. I'm not sure it's going to accomplish the goal we want it to accomplish. And those girls today, at lunch, they drove the point home, they said, no, we're not going to stop; we don't care what it costs, raise it...raise it to \$1 a pack, they said, we don't care, we're still going to find...

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: One minute.

SENATOR BRUNING: ...a way to smoke. We'll just buy worse cigarettes, plain labels instead of Marlboros. So, with that, regrettably, Senator Landis, I have to tell you I'm going to support your amendment, in case the bill goes through, but I can't support the bill, unless it's amended so that it's an enforcement bill instead of a tax bill. Thank you.

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: Items for the record.

CLERK: Just an announcement, Mr. President. Transportation Committee will have an Executive Session, now, underneath the north balcony. Transportation Committee, north balcony.

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: Senator Schmitt.

SENATOR SCHMITT: Yes, Mr. Speaker, members. I wasn't going to talk on this issue at all. I've been listening to this all morning and again this afternoon. And first off, I guess, I got a compliment on Senator Bruning for putting his priorities in the right place and going with his wife today, noon. But I got a couple questions for Senator Landis.

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: Senator Landis, would you respond?

SENATOR LANDIS: Yes.

SENATOR SCHMITT: Looking at the bill, Senator Landis, and all we've been talking about here is cigarettes. And I understand that's basically the issue. But how much will this raise the tax on the smokeless tobacco, cigars, pipe tobacco, this type of...

SENATOR LANDIS: Yeah, it raises the tax in the same proportion
