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SENATOR CHAMBERS: Would you be averse to finding a bill that we could amend that to?

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: Oh, no, absolutely not.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you, and members of the Legislature, I would favor that too. Many years ago I think a young senator, he was young then, named Rod Johnson, had brought us a bill, alphanumeric, and there was a car out at that time called Alfa Numero, or something, and people thought that it was the same thing. Some thought it was a commercial for Caesar Romero. We weren't as intelligent and intellectual in the Legislature as we are now, so we could distinguish those things. But there were people out in these counties saying that it would be too difficult to remember these new numbers when they were accustomed to dealing with the kind of number sequence that they had. So I talked to a county something-or-other group, all these people who work for the counties. I don't know if they were elected, appointed, or escapees from the county jail but, anyway, it was a motley crew of people and I was pointing out that during those years, we were talking about education and helping the students learn more, and asking, how in the world is it that some of those people who, in various areas, who didn't want property taxes increased because they thought kids were learning so much in school anyway, I said you're going to tell me those kids are learning a lot in school when you are a product of those schools and you can't remember three letters and three digits? Well, that got a big laugh, just from that crew that was in that room, but there has been opposition to the idea of multiple letters and multiple numbers. Even cops, with whom I don't see eye to eye on many things, feel that the three letters and three digits would be easier to remember. I don't know if they mean for themselves or for those who would see somebody making a getaway from a bank robbery and it'd be easy to remember the bank robber's license plate number, but I think that would be, for the reasons Senator Kristensen gave and other reasons, a good policy decision for the Legislature to make. So I'm going to look for a bill and Senator Kristensen is not averse to the idea. I'm going to see if there are others who have a similar interest, and if it seems that we could do something like that, I would like to see it done and maybe certain other problems we have with fees and whatnot would just
