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B, C, D, and E. Split down the middle, this is at the Omaha Correctional Facility, we have five units that are divided into two, and that's why the up and down line coming through the end for north. They are lockable, separated into units, where they could separate juveniles that they have in that facility and keep them by themselves. They sent out with the administration a page of six different areas of why they did not want to transfer the facility, and one was youthful offenders' safety, which is important. However,...

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: One minute.

SENATOR Dw. PEDERSEN: ...right now in Corrections, they have 33, 33 prisoners, now that I say right now, this was the January number that he gave, teenagers who are 18-year-olds that are in adult populations. They are not in the secure confinement facility for youth because they don't have room for them all out there if they are going to move the 18-year-olds all out there. And when they originally started moving kids out there, their intentions was to use 16- and 17-year-olds only, but now there's too many. All of our youth that come into the system, even for that facility, go into adult population to begin with for 6 months to 8 weeks to go through the Diagnostic and Evaluation Center, but they are saying safetywise they cannot put them kids with adults, but they are. About half of the 18-year-olds they have are with adults.

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: Time.

SENATOR Dw. PEDERSEN: Thank you.

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: Senator Thompson.

SENATOR THOMPSON: Thank you, Mr. Speaker, members of the body. Before I get back to the amendment, I do want to make some comments about the Juvenile Justice Task Force and the bills that were introduced that Senator Chambers referenced this morning. We are at a crisis point in the juvenile justice system. We are not serving children well. We have children in overcrowded facilities and in inappropriate placements. As Senator Pedersen said, we have, because of the inadequacies of our system, children being placed out of state where we don't
