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break these units down, they have a mental health unit, they have a segregation unit, they have a protective custody unit. They break them down. They separate them. They see one another when they pass one another in the hallways going to food, going to eat, or they may see one another through a fence when they're in the yard, but they can be separated so they can't physically get at one another. It can be done in this unit with a little work. Public safety, talk about, you know, these prisoners are going to learn drastic things from the other prisoners, which they can. Some of them already know the drastic things they can learn and, again, they can be separated, if they'd used the facility they had, but they have never tried to do that before. These kids are mixed now, and I'm saying they shouldn't have been from the very beginning. Insufficient capacity, they say here that if the number of offenders currently in this age category remain steady, youthful offenders alone will fill the secure confinement facility. And the sentence before that, I should have read that too. They are talking about 16- and 17-year-olds, when they get enough 16- and 17-year-olds to fill this place, ask Corrections where they are going to put the 18-year-olds? I tell you where they'd put them today, back where they have half of them already, in adult population. And they'll be in here asking for more beds and, again, they could be separated in one of them units out at OCC. It will take...it will take some work. It would take some men, maybe some more FTEs but it can be done. Misuse of the secure institution, this is strictly a red herring because they are saying Office of Juvenile Services would be transferring the kids from Geneva and Kearney there. The kids we're holding in Geneva and Kearney are not secure confinement facility kids. Them kids are being placed in private institutions outside of the state in most cases, paid for by the county. That's not...

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: One minute.

SENATOR Dw. PEDERSEN: ...these kids. I want...they know that. That's not a secure confinement facility. We don't intend to move any kids out of them places. There's a few that could possibly, they're acting up in such a way but the judges are now placing them in private institutions so they have safety and know that they're secure because they know that the YTCs are not secure confinement facilities. And the last two I have not much
