much. It will have to do with money, obviously, in the end, but I would wholeheartedly support the idea.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And, Senator Dwite Pedersen, I think if we could get a consensus on the floor because it's never going to be unanimous, I think we could go after the money, and there might be people who are not engaged in this discussion at this point because to them we're going nowhere with the bill or the committee amendments as they exist now because the ultimate aim is kind of fuzzy. We're going to send good money after bad, and some people are distressed about the types of placements that would be taken away from the judges if the committee amendments are adopted. For example, a child could be placed with a moral individual or a family, or under the Department of HHS. So a guardian ad litem would then not be in a position to go to a judge and say, this child needs psychiatric help and I would like that to be authorized.

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Well, if HHS was not going to do it, there's nothing the judge can do. Currently, the judge is not prohibited from doing that. So there are additional problems with the committee amendments besides the one that I have talked to you about relative to your aspect of it. I'm telling you that so you know I'm not just picking on you. Now here's the question...oh, did you say one minute, Mr. Chairman? Then I won't ask the question now because there's not enough time.

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: (Visitors introduced.) Senator Dwite Pedersen.

SENATOR Dw. PEDERSEN: Thank you, Mr. Speaker, members of the Legislature. This will be my last time to talk on this amendment, my third time and last, but what Senator Chambers is talking about is the smart way. It's the thing that needs to be done. I want to take you back just a little bit in history, and there's going to be some more talking as we get into other amendments or on the bill, itself, and see what we can do here. But up until about three years ago, the YDC, Youth Development Centers in Kearney and Geneva, were under the Department of Corrections, and we've had such an influx of prisoners in the
