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somehow it'll work out. Frankly, although it talks about the neglect that's already occurred out there, it just didn't happen this year or last year or the year before, but I think it's been ongoing, and to just start throwing money out at it, Senator Chambers uses the, you know, terminology as far as the wine in the old bottle, you know, and that's what we're doing, and it doesn't need to happen. I think this issue needs to be forced to come to some sort of a...some sort of a head and, frankly, to just pour more money without any idea as to how it's going to be utilized or any projections is simply going to just perpetuate the problem that we have there. I had an individual who called me. Her son is at Kearney, had a hard time visiting her child. I would like to know, you know, why is this facility where it is even, and why don't we, you know, the modern thing, the nice thing, the respectful thing is to try to keep the juveniles as close to the family as possible, you would think, unless that state's idea is to get them away from their parents whenever possible. I don't think...I don't think that that's modern programming. I don't think that that's benevolent. I don't think that that helps the child whatsoever, but to try to maintain some sort of support system with the family. I can't support something that just doesn't...that doesn't do anything, really. I mean the only...again, I have great respect for...Senator Connealy and I were talking and we're almost in the position of, you know, is it all or nothing. Do we do this or nothing? And we do need to look for that third way. Senator Chambers made reference to that, that third way. That, it's not new to me and that's why I didn't vote for this bill in the first place. We need to spend some money but we need to...we need to spend it wisely. We need to have the suitable programming for these kids and not just throw some money that we don't even know how much it's going to be, but we're just going to start turning on a spigot with what the cigarette tax will be and we'll just start spending money. You know, is that our only choices? I'll yield the rest of my time to Senator Chambers, if he so desires, but, Senator Chambers, you've been here for many years, and I've only been here for a few, the senior member of our committee, if you will, and how long has this problem, if you will, persisted?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Even before I got here, Senator Hilgert, in one form or the other, so it's not a new thing. But some people
