SENATOR THOMPSON: Okay, so I'm going to use a little bit of time here to talk about some of the issues that will be coming up when we get to the green copy. One of the things that has been distributed to you that I think is very telling is, and it has a green cover, it's statistics from both the IR...YRTC's at Kearney and Geneva. It will tell you how many commitments they had in two time periods, fiscal years, for which their most recent statistics are, where they come from in the state. I think there's some misperception out there that they're all coming from the eastern part of the state. That is not true. In fact, if you'll look at Kearney and Geneva, only about 20 to 23 percent of the kids at both facilities are from Douglas County. They do come from all parts of the state. We have...this is an issue for everywhere. Even though some of us from the eastern part of the state have spent a lot of time talking about it, I think in all your districts you're going to see kids there, and it's important that we have facilities and programs that are adequate to their needs. The other thing that you will see are the types of crimes that they have committed and on the second page of each of those handouts are some...is information on the types of crimes that have been committed. One of the things we learned from the study was that the kids who are at Kearney and Geneva are a lot different from the kids who were there 10, 15 years ago. Their problems are more serious. The crimes they commit are more serious and they're committing them at a younger and younger age. And one of the things that we need to do in addition to the facility study of the buildings is to look at the programming, look at the staffing of these facilities, so this plan will be able to do that. I want to address some of the issues that Senator Chambers has raised and some of you have been talking about in terms of the facilities. The way the bill is written, new facilities can be built. What we will do is take a comprehensive look at Kearney and Geneva, but I don't want to minimize the fact that we need these facilities. We just need some upgrades at Kearney and Geneva and some new buildings. One of the buildings that's been proposed for Geneva is to have a new area constructed that would provide medical treatment portion, currently, they're in very, very cramped quarters; eight beds for incoming youth, there isn't a way to segregate them from the rest of the population at this time; some special needs space at that facility. These are ideas that have been
