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becomes available to the user, especially if they need that to support their own habit. One of the issues that always comes up about this has to do with the danger of the labs themselves. And I think this is apparent; as I said, there was a meth lab that was discovered right across from a grade school in Grand Island. In a pickup located on the property, there was enough ether that, had it exploded, it would have blown up two city blocks. Typically, for every one part of meth...

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Time. Senator Chambers, you are next.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Madam President and members of the Legislature, I'd like to ask Senator Peterson a question. Senator Peterson, what was that first phase of meth use described...I meant, termed.

SENATOR C. PETERSON: The first phase, Senator Chambers, is called the rush.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Yes, and how did...and how was that rush described.

SENATOR C. PETERSON: The heartbeat races, the metabolism, blood pressure and the pulse soar, and there are intense feelings of pleasure.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: That sounds almost like what people call love, doesn't it?

SENATOR C. PETERSON: Yes, but it's much more expensive, Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Well, I don't know about that, Senator Peterson, but you're young and you haven't a lot of experience yet. Thank you very much. We're just trying to keep the discussion going until we can get an amendment drafted, but it is clear that all of these drugs that are abused have an element about them, or produce a result which a person finds desirable, and that's why people turn to these drugs. There are other people who naturally want the pleasurable aspect of it, but they have very grave problems that they perceive in their lives and these problems seem "insolvable"...unsolvable, and they don't
