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to get more people to play. That's...this is the first time we've done that. And this is the time to draw the line in the sand that says, if people want to play the lottery, fine, but we're not going to encourage them, we're not going to make it as attractive as possible. We're not going to take out huge ads with our Governor, with his arm around winners, saying, please go out and play some more lottery. We're not going to make the price of the tickets somehow more attractive, increasing the payout, so that we can get more people to take their disposable income. We're going to make the opportunity available, but that's it. If there's people who want to play, we give them the opportunity. Government should not encourage people into playing the lottery. Now a couple of things have happened recently with respect to the retailers. And, by the way, I will tell you, for those of you who weren't here, parts of the retail community that were originally excluded from selling lottery tickets came in with amendments and said, please put us in the bill.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: One minute.

SENATOR LANDIS: They asked to be in the bill. Why? Because they didn't want to have the competition being able to sell tickets and they couldn't. Is it a loss leader? I don't know if it is, I doubt it, I don't believe it. But, if it is a loss leader, it's to get people into the store. And what do they do? They buy other things. Now the retail stores, the convenience stores can have their own ATMs, which they own, and now they've busted our system of controlling ATM prices, and they're getting surcharges. We now have \$2 surcharges to use an ATM in a convenience store. The retailer takes that, they're making, in some cases, hundreds of thousands of dollars with an ATM. They take out cash, they walk up to the counter, they buy some lottery tickets, and what's conveniently placed up by the counter? The cigarettes that have been put there by the retailers, with the cigarette companies, and they get a special payment for putting their cigarettes up, by the counter, as they buy their lottery tickets, and they paid for them with the ATM that has a \$2 service charge. Excuse me? This is a losing proposition for the retailers? We do not need to come to their aid.
