it may help the Environmental Trust Fund. I think it will do just the opposite of what Senator Beutler says it will do. But I think we should give them the latitude to do this. I think it will be beneficial. Keep in mind, this has nothing to do with the big lottery, this is just the scratch tickets. Do we want to allow them to increase the payout from 53 cents to a higher number? Do we want the retailers, who sell these tickets, to get a nickel a ticket or six cents a ticket, instead of a nickel? I think it's something we should do. Like I said, it's not a big deal for me, because I don't play it. I don't like the odds. But I think for a lot of people in Nebraska it's entertainment. They know the odds are no good, I don't think they're spending their paycheck on scratch tickets, I really don't. They might go in and buy five or ten. Some people use them for gifts. I'm not promoting that, but that's what's taking place now. If there's any time left, and Senator Janssen would like to have it, I would let him have the rest of my time.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Thank you. Senator Chambers, you are next to speak. I'm sorry. Senator Schrock, did you wish to ask a question of somebody? I missed that.

And as far as the amount that the...at the retail level, Senator Landis, not all grocery stores are big supermarkets. You have a lot of these...most of these tickets are sold at little convenience stores and small stores, like my own, where we can't...you don't have enough sales in the scratch-off tickets to warrant someone standing behind a counter, continually, and doing just that.
