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misery and vulnerability, you are a moneygrubber. That's what I would be if I did it. Anybody who does it is entitled to that designation. I would like to see my colleagues every time they talk to a group of young people point out that part of their money is made by selling lottery tickets. That's how they make part of their money. But they don't talk about that. They didn't even admit that they had declared a conflict of interest as far as I know till I asked them the question. But it might have been floating around in other people's heads, what is the interest they have in this bill? I'd like to ask Senator Janssen a question, if he'll answer.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Senator Janssen, would you yield.

SENATOR JANSSEN: Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Janssen, what committee heard this bill?

SENATOR JANSSEN: General Affairs.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Were you a member of that committee at the time this bill was heard?

SENATOR JANSSEN: No.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Are you a member of that committee now?

SENATOR JANSSEN: Yes.
