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We will have more and that's the idea of these because we look at other states that have...that have slipped, and when they started their payouts better, Colorado rose 15 percent. Idaho, which I like to compare with, pretty close to our size, 8.4 percent. Kentucky was 7 percent, Ohio, 15 percent, Washington, 7 percent, California, 10 percent. So you see what...what has happened. That was a change in the...with a change in the payouts. I think if we want to keep up funding or providing schools with the incentive programs that we've set in place for them, they're declining right now, so...

SENATOR SCHIMEK: One minute.

SENATOR JANSSEN: ...some of the programs that we did put in place, we're not going to be able to keep them up, if the decline keeps going the way it is. So these are some of the facts and the figures of what...what you're going to look forward to. Hopefully, we can get this bill passed, get the committee amendments passed, and go on from there. And then I would...I would, you know, I'd take whatever happens, go up or down. That's fine with me, but I think we are...we have to try to do something to slow down the decline in the sale of these...of these scratch-off tickets especially. They're not really, 1 percent, 1 percent of the people that call this hot line were...talked with the compulsive gambling, cited that the scratch-off tickets were part of their problem. That's 1 percent that...

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Time. Senator Baker, you are next in line to speak.

SENATOR BAKER: Thank you, Madam Chairman, members of the body. To address some of the questions that Senator Beutler brought up, I really don't think this is micromanaging. This gives the lottery people...commission a great deal of latitude in which to move. The amendment says at least 15 percent shall be paid out, and, actually, we did have a meeting with them, and they do support this bill. They realize the problem. The average decline in the last several years, and once again we're talking about instant win scratch tickets, has been about 5 percent and it's been pretty steady at that 5 percent decline. It has averaged 13.6 percent the last three years so it's a pretty much
