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bordering states because that's where they go anyway, if they want to do other types of gambling. And so be it. But let's focus the debate on what this bill does. It raises the amount the retailer gets from 5 cents to 6 cents, and the best you can win is maybe a Blazer or a Tahoe or something, I don't know. I don't want to treat Chevy any different than Ford here. And where the proceeds go, I agree with Senator Kristensen, but that's not what this debate is about. If he wants to have a debate on the floor, he's got to get the bill out of committee first because I'll tell you, if you want to try and change the 49.5 percent for the environment to some other cause, you bring everybody out including my son. He says, Dad, why are you trying to change it? It's good for the environment. We need the proceeds for this Pheasants Forever, and I must confess maybe I should declare that I have a conflict of interest here because we have three pivot corners that the Pheasants Forever cost-shares with us on. And one of them is close to my brother's house and he can look out his bedroom window in the morning and he gets a kick out of seeing those pheasants. Those projects work. It is habitat for pheasants. So whatever you want to do is fine with me. I can accept your decision but let's don't talk about Powerball, and let's don't talk about the money going to the Environmental Trust. This changes the payout so these poor suckers who buy these scratch tickets can maybe get 65 cents for every dollar they spend instead of 53 cents. That's what it's about, and then maybe they can sell more and it'll generate more money but I don't know if that will happen or not. But I feel sorry for those poor suckers that buy those scratch tickets when their return on investment is 53 percent, but maybe, as a farmer,...

SENATOR SCHIMEK: One minute.

SENATOR SCHROCK: ...I'm not any smarter, I'm not sure I did much better than that last year in my farming operation.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Thank you, Senator Schrock. Senator Janssen.
