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various other states, some of them near us, some of them not so near us, that as you increase payouts, player interest does increase. So we have to keep that in mind. And another thing that entered in here, the study by the Nebraska Council on Compulsive Gamblers, the public attitude, this was a survey done in September of '98, not long ago, still says that...I am sorry, this was January of '98, still 76 percent of Nebraskans support the state lottery. That surprises me, to be honest with you, 76 percent of Nebraskans still support the state lottery. I do need to make one correction. We met with the state lottery people and they're officially neutral. They realize that they're still, regardless, they're charged with maximizing the income to these various trusts, but their official position is neutral and they do know what the bill and, of course, what we're trying to and accomplish here and that's to maximize the payout back to these trust funds but they are officially neutral. So I want to get that on record, they're not in support or...they're just neutral. With that, I believe I will yield the rest of my time back to the Chair. Thank you.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Thank you, Senator. Senator Chambers, you're next.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Madam President, members of the Legislature, I'd like to ask Senator Janssen a question.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Senator Janssen.

SENATOR JANSSEN: Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Janssen, if it cost you \$3 to make a pound of sausage, would you sell a pound of sausage for \$1?

SENATOR JANSSEN: I probably have, Senator, on a promotion.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: As a part of your business practice,...

SENATOR JANSSEN: You couldn't do it forever.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...you couldn't even do it close to forever, could you?
