SENATOR CHAMBERS: But you're going to keep selling them, even if this bill doesn't pass, isn't that true?

SENATOR JANSSEN: Well, I don't know how far into the future we'll keep doing that, Senator.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Well, we can...we can only deal with right now. If you lived till tomorrow, and this bill is killed, are you going to stop selling these tickets tomorrow?

SENATOR JANSSEN: Probably not tomorrow.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: The next day?

SENATOR JANSSEN: And I don't plan on getting...I don't plan on dying, so I'll be here tomorrow.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Well, nobody plans on it, and with the bill that I had, some would be able to but you all don't want to give those people that prerogative. Do you make...would you make a greater amount of actual dollars, Senator Janssen, if you were going to do this by percentages? Now here are my examples. Would you make more money if you got 50 percent of the sales...of the sale from two lottery tickets or you'd make more money if you got 10 percent of the sale of a thousand lottery tickets?

SENATOR JANSSEN: Actually, sure, I would make more money if I sold a thousand lottery tickets,...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: So if you sell a large volume...

SENATOR JANSSEN: ...because they are only a dollar.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...and get a smaller percentage, you'd make more in the long run than a large percentage of a very small number sold, is that true?

SENATOR JANSSEN: That's true, that's true.
