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you this. If your amendment is adopted, regulations can be changed to raise that amount above 6 percent, isn't that true?

SENATOR JANSSEN: True.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: So if regulations are going to be involved, why should the statutes do anything relative to that? I'll tell you why. You want the retailers, which includes you and Senator "Bakee"...Senator Baker, who happens to be the bakee this afternoon, along with Senator Janssen, you want to be sure that you all get at least a minimum amount which would be 6 percent. You want to be able to always get that amount as a minimum. Isn't that true?

SENATOR JANSSEN: That's true.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And no matter how much the lottery may lose in terms of players, you still would be guaranteed that 6 percent...

SENATOR SCHIMEK: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...of sales, isn't that true?

SENATOR JANSSEN: That's true.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: But if it were done by regulation, it's doubtful that you would continue to get 6 percent if the take lowered sufficiently, isn't that true?

SENATOR JANSSEN: That's true.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you, Senator Janssen. Members of the Legislature, what you all are being asked to do makes no sense to me. They are not asking me to do it. They know I'm too intelligent to do that. They are insulting the intelligence that I know the rest of you have with maybe a couple of noteworthy exceptions based on youthfulness, naivete, and lack of experience. I'd like to ask young Senator Bourne a question, while I'm in that area.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Senator Bourne, would you yield.
