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PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...right to maintain these animals between purchase and slaughter? Nobody. I'd like to hear Senator Brashear tell me that he thinks that there's some packer so stupid that he or she or they will get together and go into court and say we believe the Legislature is preventing us from owning animals at all. In other words, we cannot enter a contract valid under the laws of Nebraska to purchase livestock and own them. That is not going to be done. How will any legal issue or challenge arise? Senator Brashear has not presented that example yet. If there is nobody to challenge a law, it is never going to be ruled on by the court. The court does not issue advisory opinions. I want Senator Brashear to explain to us,...

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Time.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...as I'm sure he will, how packers are going to see the need to challenge this law.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Thank you, Senator Chambers. Senator Schrock, for what purpose do you rise?

SENATOR SCHROCK: Mr. Lieutenant Governor, members of the Legislature, I was...

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Would you like a point of personal privilege?

SENATOR SCHROCK: Yes, I would. Point of personal privilege.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Senator Schrock.
