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a Liquor Control Commission rule as a discretionary option to temporarily suspend the right to sell alcoholic liquor for up to ten days in addition to the fine. And that's what I ask the body to do. It should not be the record of this Legislature that the liquor lobby and the retail lobby get less controls for the sale of alcohol to minors, and will not provide us a forum and will not permit a forum to be done on this floor to bring that issue that I've suggested to the full body. And with that, I'd ask for the adoption of the motion to suspend the rule.

SENATOR BOURNE: And that's what I'm going to ask the body to do is to agree with me that it violates the Speaker's rules and to move the bill forward.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Well, if I agree that that's what it does but, nevertheless, we want to take the vote, you still are going to be hard-headed, recalcitrant and obdurate? Is that true?

SENATOR BOURNE: Recalcitrant, yeah. Yes.
