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SENATOR BOURNE: Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: What happens?

SENATOR BOURNE: It's taken off consent calendar.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: You get an "A." Thank you, Senator Bourne. Members of the Legislature, I'm sure that the liquor industry understands what is happening here. I just wish there were more bills they had before us which they wanted. They have to be made to know, as other special interest groups like the tobacco industry, that they might run certain areas of society but they're not going to run the entire Legislature. This bill is one that is going to be denied to the liquor industry. It will not only be talked off the board during consent calendar consideration on Select File. It's going to be talked to death whenever it comes up, so if this is such an inconsequential matter to the liquor industry that it has been placed on Select File, they don't need it. So really nothing is ventured, nothing is gained. Senator Landis and I have the opportunity...

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...to express today our concerns about other issues that are of...that are substantive. I'm sure the liquor industry doesn't care whether they get this little old bill or not. I'd like to ask Senator Bourne another question but I wanted to give him a chance to finish his consultation before I proceeded with my colloquy. I learned that from the "Silver Fox." Senator Bourne, can we colloquy for a while?

SENATOR BOURNE: I'd be delighted to colloquy with you, Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: All right. Does this bill mean anything to the liquor industry?

SENATOR BOURNE: Well, I don't think it has anything to do with the liquor industry, Senator Chambers. I think it has to do with the licensees who sell alcohol.
