SENATOR CHAMBERS: Does the sale of alcohol affect the interests of the liquor industry?

SENATOR BOURNE: Oh, I suppose indirectly.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: If a lot of alcohol is sold, is that a benefit to the liquor industry or a detriment?

SENATOR BOURNE: Uh, I would think it would be a benefit.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: It'd be what?

SENATOR BOURNE: A benefit.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay. And if they sold a little alcohol, is that a benefit or a detriment?

SENATOR BOURNE: I would say that's a detriment.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Time. Thank you, Senator Chambers. Senator Bourne, followed by Senators Janssen and Landis.

SENATOR BOURNE: I'd call the question.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Senator Landis.

SENATOR LANDIS: There's a decision by the Chair as to whether or not a sufficient amount of debate has elapsed on the topic before us. I'd actually point out that there's been no opponents to the measure. Senator Janssen, I would assume would be an opponent to the motion, that hasn't had a chance to speak. I'd ask for a ruling of the Chair that insufficient amount of debate has been had.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Senator Landis, I agree that there has not been a sufficient amount of debate on the motion to suspend the rules. Senator Bourne, you, of course, could make a motion to overrule the Chair.

SENATOR BOURNE: I'd make a motion to overrule the Chair.
