required of us when we take that money. I don't believe that that's states' rights. I believe that that's reneging on a contract. So it is my estimation that if we really feel that strongly about not living by the rules, then don't take the money. By virtue of taking the money, we have substantially increased in this state child support collections. There are many, many, many more children that are receiving the financial support that they deserve from both their parents by virtue of the kinds of changes that we've made in our child support collection process. Now, there are people here who are going to worry about whether the system that we've had over a period of years, if dismantling that is worth it, because it has been successful. And I can only give you the other examples of how we've been successful to give you some comfort that this step is probably going to be successful also. There was a great deal of concern when we moved to license suspension--was it fair, was this a good idea. It was required by the federal government and there were a lot of people that didn't like that we were doing it. Since we have moved to license suspension, we have suspended approximately 220 licenses. We have increased child support collections by 9.5 percent--\$11 million more of money that are going to the children in the state of Nebraska by virtue of that change. The state of Wisconsin instituted the centralized collection of child support just in January. They are doing it through their two...

SENATOR CROSBY: One minute.

SENATOR BROWN: ...largest counties. Since they instituted the process of...the centralized collection process, the surprising thing, because the centralized collection process is really more about making the system more efficient, making it easier to do from one state to the next, making it better for employers because they have one place that they have to send wage withholding. Wage withholding represents about 50 percent of the child support that's collected and it's a figure that's increasing all the time and, because it is a steady figure, it's a better way from a systemic point of view of managing child support collection, so everything is to encourage wage withholding.
