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money to continue those activities in the same way that they've been done, and then we will have to deal eventually with the fact that we're out of compliance with all of our...

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: One minute.

SENATOR BROWN: ...our program for TANE, which is Assistance to Needy Families, and will jeopardize all that money. But right now we're just talking about the \$15 million. We will have to determine whether we're going to come up with it at the state level to continue funding it in the current system, or whether we're just going to let a system which has been so successful in making sure that children receive the assistance that they need just goes by the wayside. And so I would ask you to look that if we pass LB 637 we are going to keep in place many of the aspects of our current system. We are just going to modernize it by centralizing it. So I would urge you to oppose the bracket motion. Thank you.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Thank you, Senator Brown. (Visitors introduced) For further discussion on the motion to bracket LB 637, Senator Matzke. Senator Matzke, you're recognized.

SENATOR MATZKE: Mr. President and members of the Legislature, this bill troubles me a great deal. I don't like the idea of the federal government trying to usurp our judicial functions and take over our court system next September. I think that Senator Chambers said something that makes a lot of sense. He said, and I'm not exactly quoting him, paraphrasing him, that if you have a problem in the area of child support presently you can go to court and you can talk to somebody. That is going to be taken away from us. That's going to be replaced by a computer. This state has not had very good experience with computers. I sat on the Health Committee for five years and every year we heard about the problems of N-FOCUS. The press has been replete with reports of its expense greatly expanded. Our present child support system involves another computer system called CHARTS, which is not up and running totally in this state. All you have to do is talk to county attorneys out in the state that have to live with the responsibility of enforcing child support and they will tell you the difficulties they've encountered. Now what is proposed is that we solve all
