I'd like to ask you a question or two. And I'm going to go to page 4 of the green copy, if you're willing to oblige me.

SENATOR BROWN: Just a moment. Yes, I will oblige you.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Now, Senator Brown, starting in line 21 on page 4, it talks about the disbursement of all this money within two business days of receipt. This is how it's expressed, "except as provided in subsection 2 of this section, the State Disbursement Unit shall disburse all support order payments received within two business days after receipt from the employer or other source of periodic income, if sufficient information identifying the obligee is provided". That "if" language allows for a delay, doesn't it? That language that begins with the word "if", that would allow for a delay, wouldn't it?

SENATOR BROWN: The potential, yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And then, if we go down to line 26, which immediately follows that which is the subsection 2 exception, "The state Disbursement Unit"...

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ... "may delay the disbursement of collections toward arrearages until the resolution of any timely appeal with respect to such arrearages". What does that mean?

SENATOR BROWN: That means that if there is a dispute and... a dispute by the obligor as to the amount of the arrearage and that is being determined, the amount is being determined, that the state unit could delay the disbursement until the... it has been determined exactly what the arrearage amount is.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: But,.... Oh, I guess my time is up.

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: Time. (Visitors introduced) Senator Schmitt.

SENATOR SCHMITT: Yes, Mr. Speaker, members. I have one question for Senator Brown, if she will yield. You can use the
