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SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: Senator Chambers, you have about three minutes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you, Senator Schmitt. Mr. Speaker and members of the Legislature, Senator Brown, I want to go back to page 4, if you will. Are you there?

SENATOR BROWN: Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Brown, in order for this money to get to the state Disbursement Unit, how does the money get...if I'm the one paying child support, where do I take this money that I'm going to pay?

SENATOR BROWN: Are you talking about just...are we still back on the arrearages part, or we've moved on?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Let's go back to line 21, where we're talking about "if sufficient information identifying the obligee is provided".

SENATOR BROWN: Okay. If you are a party to wage withholding, then the business would send the check...one check to the central unit, and it would...that check would say, this is for, and list maybe ten different names of the people who are the obligors, and then who the money goes to.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: So then when these checks are issued, there could be insufficient information sent with that check for them to know to whom the money should go. Is that what this language is referring to, when it says, "if sufficient information identifying the obligee is provided"?

SENATOR BROWN: Possibly, but it's...that part is fairly unlikely. Then the other way...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Wait a minute, though.

SENATOR BROWN: Okay.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: That's all that I'll ask you.
