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single collection unit. And I think you've heard the concerns from senators having to do with the amount of time to look into disagreements, the ability to go to court and things like that. The...a second issue that comes up has to do with the whole idea that we have looked in to of accountability, local control versus the centralized location. The third issue that comes up is are we going to lose the \$15 million? Well, typically, the way it's done, it's handled in quarters. If the costs are taken up when they are submitted by the county attorneys, then the child support enforcement sends into the Administration for Children and Families that amount of money. And if it is certified, then it comes back for those costs. That would happen at the end of 1999, for the last quarter. He would also have to say we were in noncompliance now. Out of the federal statute it says, under Section 201-6, withholding of payments, reduction of federal financial participation, the costs of social services and training, when withheld. Further payments to a state are withheld in whole or in part if the administrator, after both a reasonable notice and opportunity for hearing to the state agencies administrating or supervising in the administration of an approved plan finds, one, that the plan no longer complies with the provisions of Section 2. Two, that in the administration of the plan there is failure to comply substantially...

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: One minute.

SENATOR C. PETERSON: ...without any such provision. That would be the finding. And so I think what we're looking at is a pretty good argument, yes that money will be taken away from us, if we don't do something. I think Senator Bromm said it very adequately, we have a lot of questions, we need some time to look into this. This debate is, I think, very beneficial. I oppose the bracket motion because putting it into the year 2000 does away with any options we have of working around this and trying to come up with a compromise that we're able to continue to receive the funds. And so I oppose the bracket motion and ask for your support on that.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Thank you, Senator Peterson. Speaker Kristensen, on the motion to bracket.
