SENATOR CROSBY: Thank you, Mr. President and members. Very quickly, I just have mixed emotions about both bracketing and not bracketing. Haven't quite made up my mind, but I just have to mention one thing as I open. Jon Bruning stood up a few minutes ago and he was talking about 1970 as if that were the good old days. Well, I guess it is. It's almost 30 years ago. And Dan Lynch and I have some of the same feelings about the computer systems and consultants. We yearn sometimes for the little old ladies in the courthouse who sat there and wrote everything out by hand in those books and you could very quickly and easily find out information that you wanted. You can still do that on the computer if you know all the little ins and outs of the computer. I like the bank hot line, I'll have to tell you I do, because in the good old days, as people all think of the thirties and forties, you could walk into the bank before three o'clock in the afternoon, when they closed the doors, and you wanted your bank balance or your statement, you could get it. They...very obliging people, they would hand it to you. Well, now you can find out your bank balance. You can find out what checks have cleared just by dialing a number on the phone and sitting there and writing them down. It's great. What...that's a lot easier than going down to the bank and wheedling somebody into giving you your statement, which they won't do now anyway, so don't try it. But two things I want to talk about, seriously. The computer systems at Health and Human Services are infamous. First, we had the black hole. That's what we called it, Roger, right, the black hole? The second was FAMIS, F-A-M-I-S, and we had to have that in place because, if we didn't, the feds were going to put the you-know-what to us and not give us any money, and we had to have it by October of whatever the year that was. And you know why October is magic. It's because it's their fiscal year, our fiscal year, because we are the federal government too. But after...FAMIS, for some reason we let that one go after we put a lot of money into it. Then comes N-FOCUS. That's the latest one. I guess it's still there. I haven't heard any new acronym or whatever. We...I do feel like we have to let that system breathe and work as some of the things we have set in, but the thing that worries me most, I asked...the other day I asked my staff to find out when they talk about, well, we're going to lose all this federal money, well, who is going to lose it?
