SENATOR BRUNING: I have no idea. I hope some.

SENATOR SCHMITT: I don't believe we have saved anything. Most places where computers have went in it has cost us money. And as far as the federal government, I learned a long time ago when you're threatened, after a period of time you have to call the individual or the group that is threatening you's (sic) hand, and maybe this is the time to do it. Few years back we dealt with the motor-voter registration. The federal government threatened us. We had that bill killed in committee and it was voted to the floor and it was voted out. The only thing I believe that it has accomplished, it has lowered our percentage of voters in the state of Nebraska. So I am going to support the bracket motion. I think we can delay this till January and see what the federal government is going to do. We should know by January 1 whether they're going to cut off our funds. Then we can come back and ask for them to give it back if we really need to do that. But I don't believe there's any reason to rush into this at this point in time. So, with that, if Senator Chambers would like the rest (microphone not activated), I will yield it to him.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Senator Chambers, would you like the rest of his time?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Yes, thank you, Senator Schmitt and Mr. President. I'd like to respond to Senator Kiel's comments. I had said earlier that I brought the very points that she mentioned to this judge, this former judge, who was in my office being squired by Mr. Wusk and the rest of them. What...did I say that right, Senator Bourne? Mr. Wusk and the west of...or Mr. Wusk and the rest of.... Anyway, when you take a hostage, you take as a hostage the one that you're trying to pressure would really care about, so you will get an infant, if you can, and put a razor to the throat of the infant, and say now I'm going to make you give this infant some milk, and if you don't give this infant some milk I'm going to cut the infant's throat.
