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been, with our cooperation, with our willingness to accept it, with our willingness to actually go to them and ask for more money, been working to improve child support collection across the nation. And that is the other thing that this is about. This is about across the nation. We can say we don't have any problems, and we probably don't have problems compared to a lot of places, but we, as representatives, have to be a little bit concerned about all the women and children. I'm not willing to play chicken with a locomotive. I guess I don't need that to feel like I'm a real tough person. And I don't believe that...that the federal government is...is wrong in expecting that we should be as committed to developing a system nationwide that will help make sure that all children get the child support. I hope that everyone, when we take this vote, really understands that...I mean agrees that the sanctions are going to happen. I mean I think that there's...there is an understanding of that. And if we're willing to accept the responsibility for the \$15 million at the beginning, then I...then the next step is that if we're taking a stand on this then I think we should be willing to take a stand on the 1.5, sorry, \$1.4 billion of federal funds that we get, most of which have strings attached to them. Are we going to turn back the safe drinking water funds that we get? Are we going to turn back the highway funds that we get, that we know that we have...that there are strings attached? The Oklahoma Legislature came back into special session to pass legislation to bring them into compliance. I don't think that if we are really being honest and not being hypocritical that we can go into this vote without knowing what we're voting on and that we shouldn't plan on bringing it up again, or we shouldn't plan on having a special session. We should understand that we are turning our back on assistance from the federal government and we should be willing to not be hypocritical and do it across the board. Any federal assistance that has strings, we're willing to walk away from. But that also means that we have to take responsibility and, with this vote, we're going to have to plan how we're going to deal with child support collection in the state. Are we going to come up with state money to send back to the counties? Are we going to expect the counties to do it on their own? Are we going to take away the...the...
