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people on that. Use correct data, use all the data, and I'll bet the bottom line's going to show that (inaudible) what we're doing now is way more effective than any projections the U.S. government has for us. So...

SENATOR COORDSEN PRESIDING

SENATOR COORDSEN: One minute.

SENATOR BAKER: ...that would be the option. Bracket the bill and let's get to work on an amendment. I'm sure there's plenty other bills out there. We can put some sort of a little task force together, have it be responsible back to the Legislature. Have a couple members on it and go from there. That, I'd yield the rest of my time back to the Chair. Thank you.

SENATOR COORDSEN: Thank you, Senator Baker. Next speaker, Senator Janssen, please.

SENATOR JANSSEN: Thank you, Mr. President, members of the Legislature. Seems to me, you know, if the federal government would use their head just a little bit and the states like Nebraska, where we don't have a big problem, we are...we're doing a fairly good job with controlling this, and instead of putting us all into a...into a all...one-fits-all catch situation. It seems to me that if you have...if one of the states, such as Nebraska, is doing a fine job, leave them alone. Just leave them alone. Those states that are ripping the system off or squandering their money elsewhere, then put some guidelines. Then put a situation like we're asking to be put into...into the statutes now. Let them go ahead and mandate to those people who can't seem to get a handle on their problem. Why put everyone in the same basket? I know it probably doesn't work that way, but it's too bad it doesn't. And I think if our representatives can't see the light, you know, there's only...really only one way that we can...you can address those situation. I guess that's in the polls, doggone it, and I just...I think we're being ramrodded into a situation that we're going to be sorry for. I haven't heard from my county attorney. I haven't heard from my clerk of the district court. I haven't heard from them that they're having a big problem. Seems to me, if you can go to that local person, that county attorney or
