SENATOR BROWN: Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Suppose they're not?

SENATOR BROWN: Well, the information that's on the computer is what's going to go out to each one of the counties.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: The information on the central computer.

SENATOR BROWN: Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And if that differs with that which is on a county computer, what happens to reconcile the two to determine which is correct?

SENATOR COORDSEN: Time. Thank you. Senator Wickersham, please.

SENATOR WICKERSHAM: Mr. President, I would yield my time to Senator Brown.

SENATOR COORDSEN: Senator Brown.

SENATOR BROWN: Thank you, Senator Wickersham. Mr. President, members of the body, I would finish answering Senator Chambers' question and then I have some remarks to make. The computer system, the local computer, it's not two separate computers, it's would...they would access the state records, and so they would have the same information at the state level and at the county level.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: What I'm trying to get at, Senator Brown, how would the information that the state gets have...the information the state has on its computer would come from where in the first instance?

SENATOR BROWN: The information would come when the checks are receipted, then the information would be put into the computer, and when the money is disbursed the information would be put into the computer.
