the required centralization of child support payments. Senator Brown, we've been trying to find out if that initially would give us any leeway by filing for that waiver? The initial answer that we...

SENATOR BROWN: Absolutely, absolutely none.

SENATOR BOHLKE: ...the initial answer that we received was that it would not. And so I may withdraw this amendment. But I wanted to tell you that when we get...as we work towards Select File, that I may continue to work in this area. And my thoughts, I'm going to tell you where I am on this and then let you respond. It seems to me there are two things that seem to be very troubling to people here. One certainly is the federal government telling us what to do. Two is people seem less than convinced that the people of this state are going to be better served, either by saving money or certainly by the service that clients receive, in the amount of time it takes for them to receive their child support payments. It would seem in this day and age that, if we're going to have a centralized system, we could develop something that would require a direct deposit, if a client so requested. I think that happens now in Omaha and Lincoln. I'm not sure about Douglas County. But that would be one question. And, number two, if you do not think that's possible as we would go statewide, therefore those individuals who needed the money immediately would stand a better chance, if that direct deposit were made. The second area in client service would seem to be what we could do technologically in having a web site or something available to the people in the counties to get a quicker response to questions than possibly as I laid out, if we're going to have every worker get 1,000 calls a month. Those are two areas that I may ask you, on your time, to see if there had been some discussion, some thought of moving in that direction, if you see that that's practical and something that could be accomplished. It just seems to me in this day and age, when we're spending a great deal of time talking about mailing checks from one area of the state to Lincoln, and then mailing checks back out, that we should have a better way to deal with that, and that that is being done in Lincoln and possibly in Omaha, at least that's the information I've been given. So I would ask you to respond to that. And, with that, I will withdraw this amendment.
