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forth some sort of a response. I don't know what...whether you call it a report or what. He just says, we came to no consensus and, without spending too much time here, he says he doesn't...you know, everybody felt their positions were solid and nobody was going to change and it was six people to request waivers and the others split up here, there and everywhere. And then there's also a report in here written by...report to the Governor written by Mr. Wusk. As best of my ability, that looks like the reports. Then there's various letters and so on the Judiciary Committee received from individual members on this task force who, to me, are pretty credible folks. I know them and I don't think they're pulling any punches with me. They continue to tell me day in and day out here as we go along that this report or this study was flawed, it just flat was flawed, and none of them had changed their opinion of that, and I continue to talk to them. I would like to find out who it was that hired Judge Van Pelt and what he was paid and so on. We're working on that. I think we'll get to the bottom of that in a minute. I still support this bracket motion. I have an amendment pending, obviously, that I think would help clean up the bill some, but now it's being divided and, for the life of me, I'm not quite sure why they're worried about splitting out the child fund it establishes. That goes back to the accountability. I don't know what's going on there. We'll find that out if we get that far. But as things get muddier and muddier here, I'm going to continue to support the bracket and encourage other people to do also, and if there's questions hopefully they'll get answered as we go along here. And with that, if I...I don't know how much time I have left, but I would, if it's worthwhile, I'd yield that back to Senator Chambers, if wants it. Guess maybe he's not there right now. Oh, here he is. He is here.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Senator Chambers, about a minute and a half.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you, Senator Baker, and thank you, Mr. President. Members of the Legislature, one thing that shows the seriousness with which this issue is being looked at, as well as the complication and the confusions, is the number of groups meeting on the floor trying to find out and determine what it is we ought to do. So this issue, I think, has really
