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SENATOR BOHLKE: To find out that information?

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Yes.

SENATOR BOHLKE: Not unless they have a centralized system. No, I think we can call and have some direct conversation with the individuals in Washington, and hopefully we would have that...I'm indicating we would have that information, some initial indication, before we reached Select File,...

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Now,...

SENATOR BOHLKE: ...certainly some of those things that I've raised.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Okay. I'm going to do some "what if's", and just misunder...I mean, based on conversations last week, what if they say flat, no? I mean we have to do some spade work to bring it in. I mean that's my guess and I just wondered...and then it will take some time.

SENATOR BOHLKE: If they say immediately, no, we will not look at anything, we will not look at the waivers, we will not look at what you have in place, then I believe we would come back with this amendment, report that to everyone here exactly what they have told us, and at that time the people here would then have to make a decision if, in fact, they want to say to the feds, we still will not bow down. Or then we would have the time to go to the vote, and I would imagine Senator Brown could offer an amendment that would be in the form of the green copy. And if people wish to support that, they could, or she could be working on some of the concerns in the green copy that may meet some people's concerns. I just think it allows us, from now until Select File, to do some things and puts us in a better position that all of us would feel a little more comfortable on what we're voting for and what those ramifications may or may not be,...

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Okay.

SENATOR BOHLKE: ...not only for the state, from the federal government, but the ramifications for women and children.
