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person. I can't ignore the fact that I'm a lawyer and I have that background that I have to assimilate into my decision. And my feeling is if we can get this done in a fairly prompt man...not a hasty manner, but an expeditious and a prompt manner, that we'll be doing a service to the people of Nebraska and we'll be doing a service to the administration of justice in our state. And I will want to, if this bill goes on, I will want to ask, and before we vote on advancing it, I will want to have some record and a commitment from the supporters, primarily from Senator Chambers and Senator Brashear, and I think they'll be willing to do this, to look at the language where we describe the information that we're asking for and the analysis, and go into some more detail in what we expect that analysis to provide us. It will not be helpful for me to have just a bunch of statistics, I'm going to need more than that. And I should say that, especially in fairness when I'm asking to shorten the period of time for the study, I need to alert the proponents that I'm going to also expect more detailed information than what is set forth in AM0785 at this point. But I think we'll have time to deal with that, if not on General File, if the bill goes on, on Select File, and between now and Select File to develop language on what that report will look like, or what we're wanting that report to do for us. So I offer you the choice. The body decided not to strip out the moratorium, so I'm asking you to shorten the moratorium by a year. And please be advised that that will require a little more in the way of resources for the Crime Commission to do their job in a shorter period of time. I think it's worth...I think it's worth doing that. I ask for your consideration for the amendment.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Thank you, Senator Bromm. On the Bromm amendment, Senator Brashear.

SENATOR BRASHEAR: Thank you, Mr. President, members of the body. I rise in support of the Bromm amendment. I believe that this is a reasonable accommodation. It was never the...at least...I can only speak for myself as to some things, but it is not the intent to introduce any kind of inordinate delay with regard to the study. The study can be...we have always known that the study could be accomplished, it's simply a matter of how we staff it. This, as Senator Bromm has been very up front to point out, this will require that it be staffed a little more
