what sense does it make to not put the brakes on the operation of that process while it's being studied? If you have a medication that you're trying to develop, and when applied to animals some live and some die, so additional study is necessary. What sense would it make to say, despite the fact that we have these mixed results, while the study and the experimentation are proceeding apace, we're going to authorize its administration to human beings? That makes no sense. It's only when we come to a consideration of the death penalty that people lose their ability to reason, they don't make rational arguments, because those on the other side really have none. Senator Tyson continues to tell you, and Senator Bruning, with his assertions, that there are no arguments they have. Senator Bruning talks about the public being enraged if you don't give these people what they deserve. Senator Tyson makes it a matter of belief, either you believe it, or you don't. But there are others who are not looking at it in those narrow terms. I have listened to the debate, to the discussion. And the honesty of Senator Schrock is almost breathtaking, because not often will you have a person acknowledge he doesn't know anything about a subject, but this is the position he's going to take and he's going to keep it. But he opines that what he does know for sure is that the system is unfair and will always be unfair, but he still supports it. Would we teach children in school that that is the way to approach a serious issue? We might tell them to do a takeoff on what Jesus said, when he said,...

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...if you have your forces and somebody is coming against you and they have a greater force, shouldn't you sit down first and consider these factors, and then make an informed decision as to whether you, with your small force, can overcome the one with the greater force. And, if not, should you not sue for peace? If we acknowledge that we don't know something, the intelligent thing is to get the information, then we make an informed judgment.
