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spike and drive it through their head with a hammer, we'll do that, then we'll stick some ice picks in 'em, too, and we'll show how much we're for the death penalty and for killing. If I were for killing, I think I would be a little more delicate and discrete in the way I expressed my desire for killing, my hatred of the people who are to be killed, because somebody might begin to wonder, if I grovel and wallow so much in this desire to shed blood, maybe I'm somebody who's got a screw loose. To use the British term for elevator, maybe my lift does not go all the way to the top floor. So I would advise some of our colleagues to think about what they're saying. And, by the way, when they quote you in the newspaper, it's not always to give you credit but to show the nature or manner of person...

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...you are. What Senator Bromm has done is to look at this situation, bring to bear his training, his experience, his views as a lawyer, and offered an amendment which even I am going to accept, because the bill's design is not to abolish the death penalty. So anything that gets us to the study and achieves the purpose of the committee amendments is all right with me.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Thank you, Senator Chambers. Senator Tyson, on the Bromm amendment.

SENATOR TYSON: Thank you, Mr. President. I think, to move this thing along, we should get a few things...take some of Senator Chambers' arguments. In the first place, I do not believe that Senator Bruning is going to run for Attorney General. He has mentioned the position of king. (Laughter) And I have it on inside information that when he does become king, he will have Senator Chambers as his Lord High Executioner, and will expect good work. Someone mentioned are we going to see this again, this same issue? Assuredly we will. Senator Chambers is the senior member of this body. He has been here, I think, six months before the earth cooled, 29 years, I believe, and I think this is his 27th or 28th time that he's introduced this bill. We're going to see it again. We're going to have this argument again, and I would ask Senator Chambers for a yes or no answer,...
