Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: It's a leading question. The amendment that we adopted does benefit the packers, isn't that true?

SENATOR BRASHEAR: It benefits them in not having to start reporting on January the third.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: No. Whom? Commerce is not a "whom," commerce is a "what." What other interests then in...

SENATOR BRASHEAR: All right, then I stand corrected. It's all the people who are affected by commerce, that would be agriculturalists, urban dwellers,...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: How...how are urban dwellers helped by this reporting not taking place?

SENATOR BRASHEAR: Because if you impose a repetitive,
