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SENATOR BRASHEAR: I do not.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you, Senator Brashear. I'd like to ask Senator Dierks a question.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: One minute. Senator Dierks, would you yield?

SENATOR DIERKS: You bet.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And, Senator Dierks, I'm going to run out of time, so I hope somebody...if Sheriff Schmitt is back there, maybe he'll give me some time. On occasion it's necessary to let people do what they think is the wise thing to do. But then the record ought to be clear on what has been done. Senator Dierks, did anybody from the packing industry, did any of the packers come to you and ask you for a delay in this date for the reporting?

SENATOR DIERKS: Yes, yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay. Now, what reason did they give to you as to why they wanted the delay?

SENATOR DIERKS: Well, as I recall, you know, much of the Ag Committee met with those packers at one time. And that was one of the purposes in coming there. And I think that the reason they gave is they wanted to see if federal legislation wouldn't be developed that would take care of the problem, instead of having state...

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Time. Senator Dierks, you're recognized.

SENATOR DIERKS: Let's continue the dialogue, Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Now, is there anything in the amendment that we have adopted which specifies what has to be in that federal legislation, in terms of what is reported?
