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SENATOR CHAMBERS: That's not the question that I asked. Have you heard of anybody going bankrupt?

SENATOR BRUNING: Certainly.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Have you heard of companies that had been in business for a long time going bankrupt?

SENATOR BRUNING: Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: So longevity in business does not protect one, in and of itself, from going bankrupt.

SENATOR BRUNING: Right.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Is that true?

SENATOR BRUNING: Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Could a person be in business operating at a loss but hoping to pull it out?

SENATOR BRUNING: For some time, but not without another source of income.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: So Senator Janssen could be operating at a loss and his other source of income could be his salary in the Legislature. Is that true?

SENATOR BRUNING: (Laugh) Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you, Senator Bruning. You're very helpful. And I'm not going to ask Senator Janssen whether he pays taxes or not, but sometimes we make presumption and assumptions which are not necessarily based on the evidence which is in the record.
