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or has adopted a comprehensive development plan, prior to June 1, 2000, the county board may adopt temporary zoning regulations by resolution, after appropriate notice and hearing. Ten days' notice must be given and a copy of the proposed temporary zoning regulations, including any resolution or map, must be available for ten days. Any temporary zoning regulation shall consist of zoning regulations that have been adopted or are in use in another county, from no more than five of the closest geographically zoned counties. The county board may adopt an entire set of regulations from one county, or may adopt portions from each or any of the counties. There are restrictions on temporary zoning. A county may not implement a moratorium on livestock waste control facilities; may not impact any land use existing and lawful at the time temporary zoning is adopted; may implement setbacks for livestock operations or facilities of no more than one-half mile from the nearest occupied resident, other than that occupied by the owner or operator, or with the consent of the residence owner, and may prohibit livestock operations or livestock facilities to be located within one mile of an incorporated city or village, or concentration of ten or more residences within one-quarter square mile. Any temporary zoning regulations adopted under this act shall expire January 1, 2002. As you will note from the handout, the colored map of Nebraska, a number of counties have zoning in place now and a number of others are in the process of doing so. As you will note, 22 counties have not adopted a comprehensive plan or zoning resolution. There are white areas on the map...or, these are white areas on the map. Thirty-four counties have adopted a comprehensive development plan and zoning resolution. These are the yellow ones; they're all finished. And then there's 10 counties that have adopted a comprehensive development plan. These are the blue ones. Twenty-seven counties are in the process of developing a comprehensive development plan. These are the green shaded areas. This amendment addresses the white, the blue, and the green counties. This bill will give those counties who want to use it a mechanism to address issues at the local level. I ask for your support and I would yield the rest of my time to Senator Raikes.
