25 years. Well, in my own experience, I can think of maybe several things I should have gotten done the last 25 years which I have...I have not accomplished, but it doesn't really matter. What we're up against now is what we can do from this point forward. If this is good policy now then it ought to be good policy six months in the future, a year in the future, two years in the future and so on. I would strongly suggest that we...that we leave the date as it is and not adopt this amendment. Thank you.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Thank you, Senator Raikes. Further discussion, Senator Janssen.

SENATOR JANSSEN: Thank you, Mr. Lieutenant Governor, members of the body. I feel as though that the June date in '99 was too quick. That...we'll barely get...we'll barely get this on the books, and you're going to have to be done. That was...that was not...not a good idea. A compromise I believe is the first of January of the year 2000. And I look at some of the counties, counties that I never ever dreamt would even be thinking about...even be thinking about zoning--leave us alone; we'll do as we please--but there are not very many of them left. There are not very many of them left and I think that the ones that are left, I'm looking at...I'm not going to name any, but I'm looking at one, one county who is surrounded by those that are...that are already zoned. I can't understand why that county does not have any zoning. But the five counties that are around it are similar. They have similar interests, similar agricultural interests, cities that are similar, so they...they will be able to adopt those...those...the interim zoning from those...from those other counties that are close to them. I think that's a very important part of...very important part of the bill. And I...I see the ones that have nothing and I think of a county that Senator Connealy and I were to on Sunday, and thank goodness that county has zoning. If they wouldn't have had, they would have been after...after someone to make a decision for them. When we left that meeting, we told those people that this is in your hands. It was a problem with something that wants to come into that county. So don't come...don't come to the state, don't come to the federal government, but it rests in your hands because you are...because you are zoned. And it made me feel good that that was...that
